After 12 years in our location at 42nd Street and Cedar Avenue, SENA pulled up stakes and began a search for a new home. In July, we moved temporarily into the annex building of Our Redeemer Oromo Church on 28th Avenue while we looked for a more permanent location in the neighborhood. We are so grateful to our friends at the church for making space for us.

In December we moved into our new location at 4557 34th Avenue South. We celebrated with an open house and gallery opening attended by over 200 of our neighbors. The SENA office is available free of charge for use by community groups/businesses/individuals located in our neighborhoods.

3. Local, Small Business Environment


Goals & Objectives: Support, strengthen, and expand the local business environment.

Plan Modification

In 2017 the SENA Board of Directors requested a modification of our Neighborhood Revitalization phase two plan to realign remaining funds to more relevant strategies. With input from the community, we were able to access to an additional \$240,000 for neighborhood programming. Funds were earmarked for a home improvement loan program, youth programs in our parks, and protecting water quality in Lake Hiawatha and Minnehaha creek through the installation of 40+ new residential rain gardens in the neighborhoods.
